

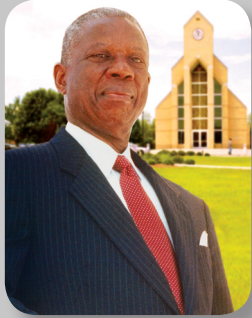

Ms. Scott urges students to do the "right thing" during Delta Founders' Day program

Since 1979, members of the Xi Rho Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated have been committed to nurturing its support to mankind and Morris College. This week, the ladies held their annual Founders Day program and celebrated the organization's founding and chartering on the campus.

The theme chosen for the occasion was adopted through the national theme for the organization which is, "A Sisterhood Called to Serve - Transforming Lives - Impacting Communities." The featured speaker was Ms. Sylvia Scott, guidance counselor for Lower Lee/West Lee Elementary Schools.

Throughout her message, Ms. Scott's enthusiasm in connection to her varied words of wisdom motivated students to make wise decisions. As she rendered her message, she spoke about the many ways in which social networks can eliminate future endeavors when handled improperly. "Be aware, the information you give and the language you use can be and is often viewed by others. Therefore, think before you press the 'enter' or 'send' button because once you do - you can not retrieve it." She further discussed a few of the multitude of incidents that have taken place causing marriages to end in divorce and even situations of unemployment. She urged students to do the "right thing" and to always demonstrate "respect and responsibility."

True to vocation as an educator, she posed a series of questions to the audience that she called "the ethical exams." A few of them were, "the golden rule exam, the what if everybody did it test, the how would my parents feel test, and does this go against what my religious faith teaches me."

In closing, she told students to "press on" throughout life's circumstances and to "always do the right thing." The audience echoed its sentiments for her message with a standing ovation.

Dr. Malveaux to Deliver Honors Convocation Address

The Honors Day Convocation will take place at 10 a.m. on February 3, 2011. The speaker for this event will be **Dr. Julianne Malveaux**, President of Bennett College for Women in Greensboro, NC.

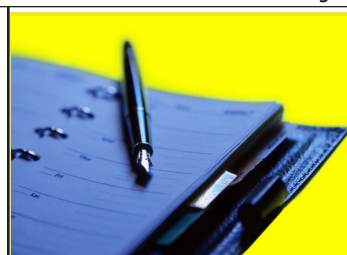
As the 15th President of Bennett College for Women, Dr. Malveaux has been the architect of exciting and innovative transformation at America's oldest historically black college for women. Under her leadership, the administration has identified four key focus areas: women's leadership, entrepreneurship, excellence in communications, and global awareness. In the three short years of her presidency, Bennett College has successfully received a 10-year reaffirmation of its accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, markedly improved existing facilities, embarked on a \$21 million capital improvements program – which marks the first major campus construction in more than 25 years – and in fall 2009 enjoys an historic enrollment high. Moreover, the campus is alive and invigorated with a new sense of purpose and passion, as the Bennett College community embraces its commitment to create an oasis where women are educated, celebrated, and transformed into 21st century leaders and global thinkers.

Dr. Malveaux has long been recognized for her progressive and insightful observations. She is a labor economist, noted author, and colorful commentator. Julianne Malveaux has been described by Dr. Cornel West as "the most iconoclastic public intellectual in the country." Her contributions to the public dialogue on issues such as race, culture, gender, and their economic impacts are shaping public opinion in 21st century America.

Dr. Malveaux's popular writing has appeared in USA Today, Black Issues in Higher Education, Ms. Magazine, Essence Magazine, and the Progressive. Her weekly columns appeared for more than a decade (1990-2003) in newspapers across the country including the Los Angeles Times, Charlotte Observer, New Orleans Tribune, Detroit Free Press, and San Francisco Examiner. She has hosted television and radio programs, and appeared widely as a commentator on networks, including CNN, BET, PBS, NBC, ABC, Fox News, MSNBC, CNBC, C-SPAN and others.

Dr. Malveaux has been a contributor to academic life since receiving her Ph.D. in economics from MIT in 1980. She has been on the faculty or visiting faculty of the New School for Social Research, San Francisco State University, the University of California (Berkeley), College of Notre Dame (San Mateo, California), Michigan State University and Howard University. She holds honorary degrees from Sojourner Douglas College (Baltimore, Maryland), Marygrove College (Detroit, Michigan), University of the District of Columbia, and Benedict College (Columbia, South Carolina). She received her bachelor's and master's degrees in economics at Boston College.

A native San Franciscan, she is the Founder and Thought Leader of Last Word Productions, Inc., a multimedia production company headquartered in Washington, D.C.
